

- Continuity breakdown: Use a continuity script to track each character's look scene by scene, noting any changes required.

 Working with actors: Build rapport with actors to make the continuity process smoother. Be respectful and communicate clearly about what you need for continuity.

Unit 4: First Day of Work

- Paperwork you'll need to fill out: This typically includes contracts, non-disclosure agreements, and tax forms.
